Tullio Treves was born in Tucuman (Argentina) in 1942 from Italian parents. Citizen of Italy and Argentina, he lives in Italy.

He speaks and writes fluently in English, Italian, French, and Spanish.

He has had a distinguished academic career in Italy where, since 1980, he is Professor of International Law at the University of Milano School of Law. He has also taught in numerous academic and other institutions in all continents, including the Hague Academy of International Law, the University of California at Berkeley School of Law, the UN sponsored courses of international law in the Hague, Quito, Addis Ababa, the Universities of Paris I and II, of Aix en Provence, of Madrid.

He has been active in many capacities in practical activities dealing with international law and especially the Law of the Sea. He has been a member of the Italian delegation to the Third UN Conference on the Law of the Sea, to the Law of the Sea PrepCom, to the early sessions of the International Seabed Authority. From 1984 to 1992 he has served as Legal Adviser to the Italian Mission to the UN in New York. From 1996 to 2011 he has served as Judge of the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea being twice the President of the Seabed Disputes Chamber, including during the deliberation of the Advisory Opinion of 1 February 2011 on the Responsibilities and Liabilities of Sponsoring States.

He has been an advocate before the International Court of Justice and International Arbitral Tribunals. He has arbitration and consulting experience. Currently, he is a member of the Arbitration Tribunal in the Bangladesh/India delimitation case.

He is a member of the Curatorium of the Hague Academy of International Law and of the Institute of International Law.

He is the author of numerous books and articles in four languages covering various aspects of public and private international law, with special emphasis on the Law of the Sea and the Settlement of International Disputes.
